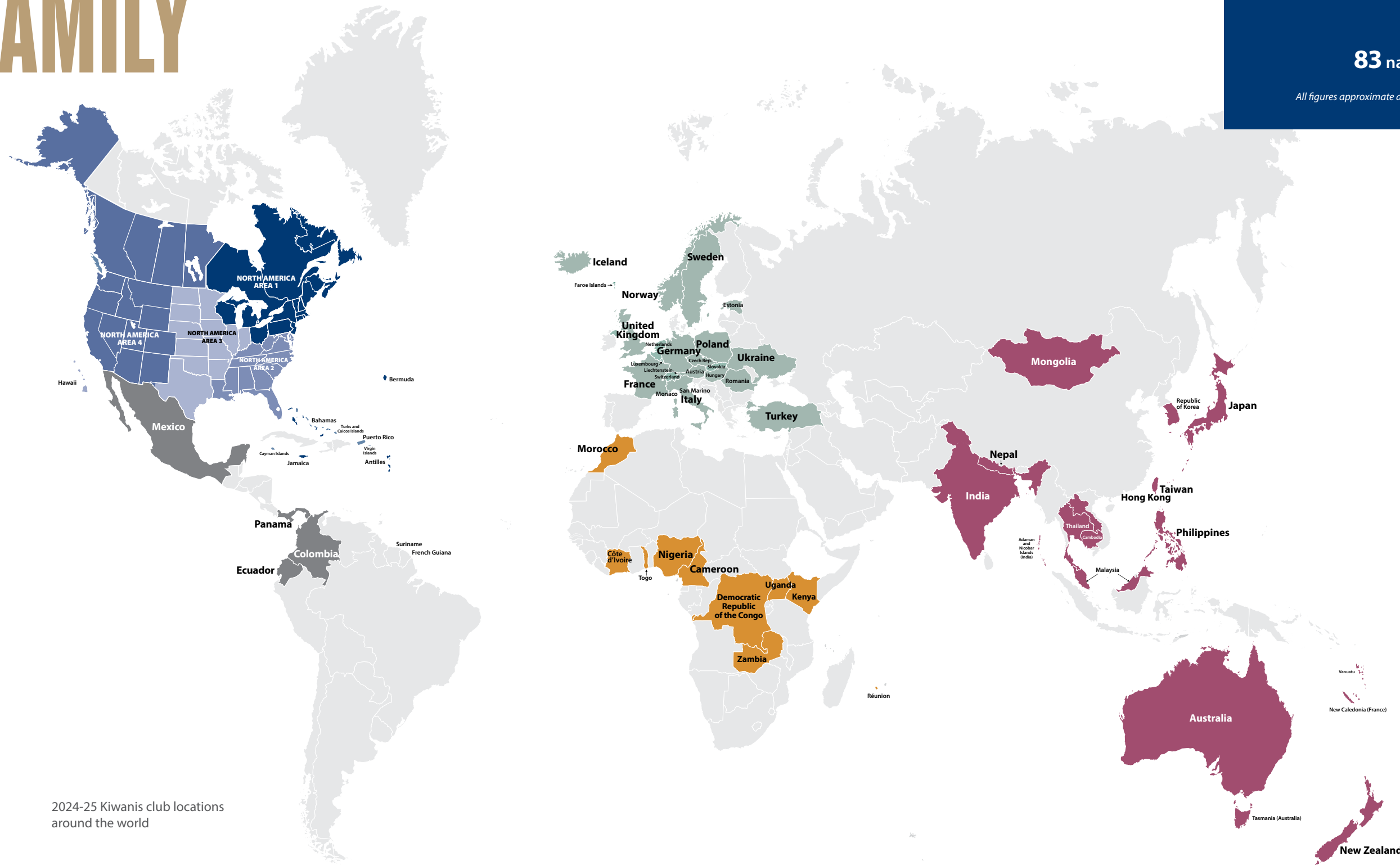

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

Kiwanis International has a vision: Someday, all kids will wake up in communities that believe in them, nurture them and provide the support they need to thrive.

To help make that vision a reality, Kiwanis members provide a continuum of impact — from childhood into adulthood. With the support of the Kiwanis Children’s Fund, as well as local and international partnerships, they make that impact through service that supports the three Kiwanis causes.

Children who get a healthy start in life are better able to learn, grow and thrive. Throughout the 2024-25 Kiwanis year, grants from the Kiwanis Children’s Fund helped clubs improve the health and nutrition of 365,378 children around the world.

In an area of Mombasa, Kenya, more than 41,000 households have relied on one submersible pump for water. For the **Kiwanis Club of Mombasa**, a Children’s Fund grant is helping to purchase a water truck with a pump, which will deliver water to eight hospitals, one clinic, four dispensaries, four secondary schools and 18 primary schools. Reliable access to clean water for drinking and sanitation will improve the health and self-esteem of over 60,000 children while spurring economic growth in the area.

In Nepal, the **Kiwanis Club of Dhaulagiri** has an ambitious plan to combat childhood cancers in the community — starting in the small, rural Melung Village Development Committee. Thanks to a Children’s Fund



grant, club members can reach thousands of children and families. Grant funds will enhance the club’s support for early diagnosis and improved access to treatment, which include educational workshops, awareness campaigns, mobile screening clinics, training sessions for healthcare professionals, fundraising events and more.

In Jamaica, not even Tropical Storm Raphael could stop the **Kiwanis Club of West St. Andrew** from holding the 2024 Ferry Health and Dental Fair. There is no nearby health center for the Ferry community, which suffers from high poverty and unemployment levels, along with a lack of running water. With help from volunteer medical professionals and partners such as Jamaica’s Ministry of Health and Wellness, the club provided free health screenings (including blood pressure checks, diabetes testing and HIV and STI testing and counseling), treatments, dental cleanings and nutritional counseling to over 3,500 patients

during the three-day fair. Patients also were provided with three cost-free months of any prescribed medication.

Smaller Kiwanis clubs also made a huge difference in 2024-25. In New York, U.S., the 30 members of the **Kiwanis Club of Plattsburgh** collected enough donations of money and supplies to fill all 901 seats of



the local Strand Theatre with 21.5 pounds of items for people in need. Thanks to a Children’s Fund microgrant, more baby food and formula — always much-needed items — were included. And in Panama, the **Kiwanis Club of Las Claras**, with just 19 members, used a microgrant to purchase 100 pairs of rubber boots and waterproof capes so that kids can safely walk to school through heavy rains.

In addition, pediatric medicine support grants were awarded to two Kiwanis clubs in 2024-25, helping local medical facilities provide the best possible care for young people. The **Kiwanis Club of Harrison**, Arkansas, U.S., is providing equipment to expand services at a pediatric-therapy gym for kids with sensory processing and developmental disorders, while the **Kiwanis Club of Anthem Ranch**, Colorado, U.S., is renovating the mental health unit at a local children’s hospital to make it more safe and welcoming — and to help it accommodate more patients.

These are just a few of the projects in which Kiwanis clubs work with partners and the Kiwanis Children’s Fund to ensure a healthy future for children around the world.



EDUCATION AND LITERACY

The ability to read — and to enjoy reading — is a key educational resource. When it's established early in life, a child has a solid foundation for future success. Kiwanis service projects help build that foundation for kids around the world. In 2024-25, the Kiwanis Children's Fund made over US\$143,000 in grants that helped clubs reach more than 52,000 kids with opportunities for education and literacy.

In 2024-25, support and partnership were as important as ever. For example, members of the **Kiwanis Club of Highland** in Indiana, U.S., want kids in the local school system to find the joy of reading at an early age. So members have prioritized working with school administrators to make reading fun and accessible for kindergartners. In 2024-25, a grant from the Kiwanis Children's Fund helped the club purchase 500 new books — a boost for the club's ongoing Reading is Fundamental Book Giveaway, during which members visit every kindergarten class in Highland's six public and private schools to read an age-appropriate story.

The Highland club schedules its visits to coincide with each school's Scholastic Book Fair. Scholastic, a Kiwanis International partner, focuses on inspiring children to become lifelong readers. After listening to the selected story, each student chooses a brand-new book at the fair — ensuring that children whose families couldn't otherwise afford to shop are able to take home a new book, just like their peers.



The **Kiwanis Club of Cynthiana** Kentucky, U.S., has long been dedicated to encouraging academic success among the city's young students. Each year, club members host a pizza party in each of Cynthiana's five elementary schools to celebrate students through Bring Up Grades (BUG), a Kiwanis program that recognizes primary/elementary school students who raise their grades or maintain good grades from one grading period to the next.

In 2024-25, a Children's Fund grant helped the club purchase pizza and beverages for 500 BUG participants. Through BUG, students set their own goals and participate in peer mentoring, which involves their classmates in their success. And when they reach their goals, the entire class celebrates. That's where the Cynthiana club's pizza parties come in. Members work with two local businesses to purchase discounted pizza and beverages, as well as certificates that mark each BUG participant's success. The certificates are a key component — because for some students, it will be the only recognition they receive.

The club's pizza parties and certificates have become well known in the local schools, giving young students additional motivation to succeed. Club members check in with all BUG participants quarterly to offer encouragement and provide any support needed to help the students reach their goals.

Service, support and partnership. Throughout 2024-25, they came together to help the Kiwanis family serve children — and open doors to a better life through literacy and education.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Service isn't just something children and young people receive from our members — it's a way for them to make an impact of their own. In fact, Kiwanis Service Leadership Programs (SLPs) give kids, young adults and adults with disabilities opportunities to develop their leadership skills throughout their lives.

For **Key Club**, 2024-25 was an historic occasion: Our program for students ages 14-18 celebrated its 100th birthday in 2025. Throughout the year, members of the Kiwanis family — from current Key Club members to alumni, advisors and many others — participated in events and commemorations.

Among the year's prominent events was a weeklong Centennial Celebration in March 2025. Each day of the week had a theme related to Key Club's history and provided a new opportunity for service (including "100 Acts of Kindness Day" on that Wednesday).



during an historic gavel-pass ceremony. Of course, service was added to the celebration: In partnership with a local nonprofit, Key Club members assembled 250 birthday kits (aluminum cake pans packed with cake mix, frosting, party supplies and decorations) to help families in need celebrate birthdays of their own.

Key Club continued to fulfill its mission during the rest of the year. For example, its partnership with UNICEF USA grew stronger with the progress of Start Strong: Zambia, a fundraising campaign that helps provide young children in Zambia, a southeastern African nation, with the care and resources that support early education.

One result of the Start Strong: Zambia campaign is the construction of insakas, which are community centers where families learn and play in safe environments. In March 2025, a group of Key Club members saw these innovative hubs firsthand during a joint visit with UNICEF representatives. In addition to giving

members a chance to see how kids and their communities are helped by insakas — each of which includes a community kitchen, playground, water and sanitation facilities, and a vegetable garden — the joint excursion was a milestone in Key Club's partnership with UNICEF USA.

Growth and impact were notable parts of the other SLPs' accomplishments in 2024-25 as well. Members of **Circle K International (CKI)**, for college and university students, also continued a fundraising partnership with UNICEF USA: With the Brick x Brick project, they helped transform plastic waste into classrooms for children in the African nation of Côte d'Ivoire.



CKI enjoyed its largest increase in member growth since 2022 — and its largest growth in clubs since 2017. A record number of charters brought CKI's total of active clubs to 335 worldwide by the end of the Kiwanis year.

Once again, the Kiwanis family's youngest members were a vital part of our impact. For the third time, **K-Kids** (for ages 6-12) and **Builders Club** (for ages 11-14) started the Kiwanis year with their annual Global Kickoff. During the online event, members of those SLPs saw some of their fellow clubs' inspiring service projects — as well as an introduction to Global Service Project 2025: Make Your Community Beautiful, which gave them an opportunity to organize and execute a beautification project in their own communities.



From childhood to adulthood, members of our SLPs contribute to the Kiwanis family's impact around the world. Their service and leadership made a difference in the lives of kids and families throughout 2024-25, and the skills they developed will help ensure their continuing impact in the years to come.

Kiwanis International recognized a surplus of US\$2.44 million. This is a significant improvement over fiscal year 2024 (\$983,888 surplus) and fiscal year 2023 (\$1.7 million deficit). This improvement is a result of the \$25 dues increase that took effect in fiscal year 2025, positive investment returns and ongoing cost-containment measures.

These same factors contributed to the consolidated surplus of \$4.082 million. The consolidated financial includes six (6) different legal entities: Circle K International, Kiwanis Youth Programs, Kiwanis Children's Fund, Kiwanis Europe, Kiwanis International and our captive insurance company (KRMPFK).

The consolidated operating results (without investment income) was a surplus of \$453,194 compared to a \$3.219 million deficit last year. This turnaround clearly illustrates the effects of the dues increase and the strong cost-containment measures put into place by the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees.
